1. Japanese Nationals Stranded by Earthquake and/or Tsunami May be Eligible for Certain U.S. Immigration Benefits—In light of the earthquakes and tsunami in Japan, USCIS reminds Japanese nationals that certain U.S. immigration benefits may be available to them upon request. USCIS understands that a natural disaster can affect someone’s ability to establish or maintain lawful

immigration status. There are several temporary relief measures available to eligible Japanese nationals. Please check out our [Q&A](#) on this topic for details.

2. USCIS Continues to Accept H-1B Petitions—As of April 8, 2011, [USCIS continues to accept H-1B nonimmigrant visa petitions](#) that are subject to the fiscal year 2012 cap. The agency began accepting H1B petitions on April 1, 2011. As of April 8, USCIS had received about 5,900 H-1B petitions counting toward the 65,000 cap, and about 4,500 petitions toward the 20,000 cap exemption for people with advanced degrees.

3. USCIS Issues Final Rule on Employment Eligibility Verification (Form I-9)—USCIS published a final rule on April 15 that adopts, without change, an interim rule to improve the integrity of the I-9 process. The main changes adopted by the [final rule](#) include: prohibiting employers from accepting expired documents; revising the list of acceptable documents by removing outdated documents; and adding documents applicable to citizens of the Federated States of Micronesia and the Republic of the Marshall Islands. The final rule takes effect on May 16, 2011. Please see the attached [Q&A](#) for details.

5. USCIS and State Department Partner to Improve Overseas I-730 Processing

—USCIS and the State Department (DOS) have launched a pilot program to test new procedures for Form I-730, Refugee/Asylee Relative Petition follow-to-join cases. USCIS and DOS developed these new procedures to improve customer service and help ensure greater consistency, efficiency and security. Someone who has been granted asylum or refugee status in the United States may file a Form I-730 to have their spouse and/or unmarried child(ren) follow-to-join them in the

United States. Overseas, the beneficiaries of Forms I-730 filed by “asylees” are known as follow-to-join asylees. Beneficiaries of Forms I-730 filed by “refugees” are known as follow-to-join refugees. The new procedures are being piloted in: Addis Ababa, Guatemala City, New Delhi, Port-au-Prince, and Yaoundé. 6. E-Verify Gets High Marks from Employers

—A recent customer satisfaction survey validates what USCIS has long asserted – that E-verify is a viable tool to ensure a legal workforce in the United States. A report about E-Verify issued by the Government Accountability Office (GAO) cites improvements in the reduction of mismatch rates, ensuring employer compliance, and securing employees’ personal information. E-Verify received a very high customer satisfaction score – 82 out of 100. One E-Verify feature that respondents liked best was its customer support, which received a score of 89. Other survey findings revealed that most users would recommend E-Verify to other employers, were confident in E-Verify’s accuracy, and were likely to continue using the program.
